Class Overview

A human's quest is to feel, think and communicate...in any language.

Human experiences, and their feelings about them, are universal. Life's themes transcend borders and countries. In the end, which differences in cultures actually matter? World literature is a good source of clues to learn about "our neighbors on this shrinking planet Earth".

Students will discover the meaning of human experience through the language of literature. Students will explore and learn from the differences among cultures and time. Students will communicate reactions, reflections, and questions. Students will write to practice skills in summarizing, analyzing, comparing and contrasting, describing, classifying and persuading. Students will write to enable themselves to use the writing process for their own purposes, attack a new writing problem confidently, and succeed in communicating with others.

Don Quixote Overview

Written between 1605 and 1615, **Don Quixote**, also known as *The Ingenious Gentleman Don Quixote of La Mancha*, is a novel by Miguel de Cervantes Saavedra. The novel, originally written in Spanish, is about a wannabe knight, Alonso Quixano, who drags a farmer, Sancho Panza, along on a series of adventures to restore the idea of chivalry back to its former glory.

Interestingly, in addition to being considered one of the greatest works of fiction, *Don Quixote* is one of the earliest novels. A **novel** is defined as a fictitious book-length prose story that focuses on character development and action.

Guiding Question: Don Quixote's insanity is the subject of much controversy among literary critics. Is Don Quixote really insane, or is his behavior a conscious choice? What might account for the change in his behavior over the course of the novel?

Group Work

1. Read <u>Don Quixote</u> and prepare for your book talk. Write a response according to the CRC method.

C- Claim- What do you believe to be true?

R- Reference- Use a specific example or quotation from text to support you claim

C-Commentary- Why is the quotation/picture/paraphrase significant? What does it mean?

Be prepare to share your response each day in a book talk. At the end of the book talk, respond with 2-3 sentences/picture/diagram/etc. Respond in your writer's notebook for EACH assigned reading from <u>Don Quixote</u>.

<u>3. Due Daily----Dialogue</u> -*Read and mark up the text and create a question for dialogue. After completion of dialogue, write your take-away in your writer's notebook and share.*

4. Due 09-15/16 <u>Don Quixote</u> Character Review Project: Must have a visual presentation (skit, Prezi, slideshow, photos, story board)
