essential understanding

Poets in the United States have, from the earliest years of the country, used poetry to champion the ideal of democracy. Other poets have challenged American society's failure to live up to the promise of that ideal. Despite living and writing in different eras, American poets across time share some things in common: a yearning for **artistic innovation** ("make it new" was the motto of American modernists), to authentically **express one's individual experience** (whether in ecstasy or agony, or somewhere in between), and to use poetry as a way to **raise our social awareness and political conscience**. This quarter, we will take a deep dive into different eras and kinds of poetry in America, and to investigate the diverse forms of poetic expression...

overview

The emphasis of the quarter will be on understanding how **forms** of poetry create the unique experience of a poem--the feelings it inspires, the thoughts and images it provokes, the social bonds it brings into being, the political messages it conveys, and the spiritual wonder it produces. There will be assigned poetry readings on CommonLit (see below), poetry packets (made by Mr. Neilson), as well as student-selected poems. Over the quarter, we will investigate American poems, poets, and poetry, and the term will culminate in a **group research project** on a single American poet and a **creative project on poetic terms**.

guiding questions:

I. How do you define beauty? Is beauty subjective or objective?

II. What are the main formal features of poems? How does a poem's *form* create or shape its *content*?

III. What is the relationship of poetry to song? How do some of your favorite songs utilize the formal tools of poetry?
