This course will explore the essential questions of human existence through the study of diverse philosophical traditions and themes. This course serves to expand your knowledge of how questions we all ponder at some time, such as "what is life all about?", have been explored historically and how it continues to be explored today. Topics explored in this course include metaphysics, ethics, morality, aesthetics, knowledge, values and logic. Students will be challenged to develop skills in cognitive and creative exploration, logical thought, dialogue, observation, academic research and embracing multiple perspectives.

_ What is Philosophy?

Students will choose to complete 2 of the 3 below assignments

- **1. Philosophy Vocabulary-** Students will complete 8-10 of the philosophy vocabulary terms listed on the assignment rubric. Students will define the terms in 2 parts.
 - a. Official Definition- the definition/explanation of the term
 - b. Personal Explanation- In your own words how do you personally define the term? This could an illustration, example, or original explanation.
- 2. Allegory of the Cave- Students will read an excerpt from Plato's 'Allegory of the Cave' and will create a non-written piece (visual, auditory or kinesthetic) to demonstrate their understanding of the metaphysics examined in this reading. Students will also write a one paragraph reflection on their understanding of the reading and an explanation of their non-written piece.
- **3. Spaceship Earth** You are on a spaceship spinning through the infinite darkness of space. You were born on this spaceship. You cannot leave this spaceship.

This spaceship is called Earth.

Write a letter to someone not living on the spaceship telling them what life is like here.

Students will write 2-3 paragraphs and incorporate a visual element to create their letter.

- 1. **Metaphysical Collage** Students will create a collage about one of the metaphysical topics listed on the assignment rubric. Students will accompany their collage with 1-2 written paragraphs of information pertaining to a theory related their metaphysical topic listed in the rubric.
 - a. Visual Collage
 - b. 1-2 paragraphs of information about theory related to metaphysical topic
- 2. **Reading Response-** Students will complete a 1-2 paragraph written summary accompanied by a visual for 2 of 3 readings based upon the topic of metaphysics.
